"Important That You Read - Water, of course"

Today the Chronicle is sharing with you the most important information which we are ever likely to write.

Please read this summary, and if you are interested, the full longer information articles attached to our website. Other supporting documents will be linked with this longer summary.

As you know, the past year has been filled with news of water crises, largely due to the unusual storms, flooding and damage to citizens. We were lucky to have a new town engineer on board, who not only dealt with the unexpected, but was literally hip deep in mud and waste water sludge. In the course of that indoctrination, Town Engineer David Prinzhorn has discovered and disclosed the information below.

- 1. Most urgently, a two pronged issue became plain. Town residents have been complaining about brown water, and we now know that we have been dosing our water with the chemical Ferric Chloride in huge excess. More detail on that in the longer summary.
- 2. Secondly, it was discovered that 123 MILLION gallons of water have been wasted and lost. Briefly, the Town has provided water to the Rancho Manana golf course under contractual obligations entered into decades ago. A process for capturing Water Treatment Plant Backwash Water had been installed at the time the Water Plant was placed in service. It is called a "Backwash Recovery System", designed to recover sludge and decanted water from the Plant backwash stream.



This system failed shortly after the plant was placed into service, and has been "out of service" for the past several years.

The net effect was that the circulation system of water to RM and returned back to the Water Plant was bypassed, and that treated water which the town had pumped uphill for 14 miles, was instead dumped into Galloway Wash, unused and never recovered. Everyone assumed that the wet spots in the wash in the hot summers resulted from some small spring under the Wash. Instead the wet spots were coming out of your pockets.

Estimated cost, including the APS cost to pump the unused water uphill, purchase the water from the Central Arizona Project, process the water through the Treatment Plant, and the cost of staff time to send it uphill initially: Over \$88,000 YEARLY.

This is as technical as we need to be in this summary, but the abundant backup material is stored on the Town Engineer's link at: http://www.cavecreek.org/index.aspx?nid=197 and is stored at the Chronicle's link on our website...look for Water/WAC area. Start with the report named "DESERT GOLD", Water & Wastewater Strategic Initiatives. It is a very readable PowerPoint. It is saved as a pdf so everyone can open it, but call me if you need help doing so.

Letter to the Editor: Councilman Charles Spitzer - "A problem 6 years in the making"

No town council before this one, including the two Mr. LaMar served on, found it necessary to demand a maintenance plan for our critical infrastructure. Anyone owning a house or car knows routine maintenance is crucial for avoiding major expenses down the road. Well, "Down the road" is here.

A little history: The Rancho Manana wastewater treatment plant was dismantled in 2008 and 2 pumps were installed to send wastewater to the new Waste Water Treatment Plant on Carefree Highway. If properly maintained, these pumps have a lifespan of about 30 years with quarterly checkups and yearly bearing replacements. Under previous Town Councils, however, the maintenance plan was "Fix it if it's broke." In other words, no maintenance has been done on these pumps for 6.5 years.

At the 2/17/2015 Cave Creek Town Council meeting, it was announced there could be a possible spill of wastewater into the Ranch Manana community. This meeting can be viewed at http://www.ustream.tv/recorded/58945416.

Because no maintenance was done, a pump burnt out a few weeks ago. The replacement cost of this pump is \$23,000 and refurbishment cost is \$12,000-16,000 (both costs are minus shipment and installation). The 2nd pump, probably in much the same condition, may fail too.

These pumps move about 200,000 gallons of wastewater/day. A single day of spillage will cost \$100,000/day in state fines plus cleanup costs. Pump trucks to move this wastewater will cost \$20,000/day.

As you can see, annual maintenance would have been far less expensive and kept the system working efficiently.

A few months ago, the current Town Council directed staff to prepare a maintenance plan for the water and wastewater infrastructure. Creation of that plan is now in progress. This current critical situation, however, points out the fact that a plan was needed from the start, when the town purchased the water system and built the wastewater treatment plant. Amazingly, no other Council prior to the current one felt this was necessary. Surprisingly, this didn't occur to Mr. LaMar either.

Hopefully, he takes better care of his car.

The importance of community trails cannot be overestimated. Their importance to Cave Creek, how they come into being and as to why we become so emotionally attached to them, are all part of our intricate independent lifestyle.

Cave Creek currently has over 50 miles of trails; factor in the trail systems of the Cave Creek Regional Park, Maricopa County Trails and Spur Cross and over 75 miles of trails are available. And for the hardy of foot, the local network hooks up farther west to trails leading to Lake Pleasant or heading father north, to Seven Springs.

Some may say, that's plenty of trails; no more are needed. Quite the contrary is true.

Arizona Archaeology Society – Desert Foothills Chapter

Lecture Opportunity: The Western Papagueria

The Western Papagueria in southwestern
Arizona is one of the hottest and driest places
in the United States. This portion of the
Sonoran desert extends from the Gila River to
the Gulf of California and Ajo Mountains to the

Colorado River. Nonetheless, thousands of archaeological sites are recorded and a long sequence of human occupation by multiple cultures is documented in this remote corner of Arizona.

Gila Bend probably represents the general boundary of western expansion by the Hohokam and is the traditional home of the O'odham people. Recent research provides new insights into adaptations to this arid environment and also provides information of interest to modern descendant communities that once dwelled there.

The presentation, History and Human Settlement in the Western Papagueria, Southwest Arizona, discusses human use of this desert landscape through time and space that extends back to the Archaic and Paleo-Indian Peoples.



Doctor David E. Doyel (Ph.D. University of Arizona) held positions in government agencies and private consulting firms in which he conducted extensive archaeological research across the American Southwest from the United States - Mexico International border north to the Colorado plateau, and from Chaco Canyon (NM) to the Phoenix Basin. Dr. Doyel has over 100 publications and is probably best known for his research in southern Arizona. His body of work

was recognized by, among others, a

Lifetime Achievement Award from the Governor's Archaeological Advisory Commission, the Governor's Heritage Preservation Honor Award, and the Professional Archaeologist of the Year Award from the Arizona Archaeological Society. He recently retired as archaeologist for the Barry M. Goldwater Range, East for the U.S. Air Force.
